Vases & Volcanoes: Sir William Hamilton in Naples 1764-1800

Sir William Hamilton, British ambassador at the Court of the King of the Two Sicilies, had three great passions – the collecting of antiquities, volcanoes, and his second wife, the scandalous Emma. He was ideally placed therefore to indulge these passions in Europe's third largest city, Naples. Pompeii had just been discovered. Vesuvius was once again active. And Naples, the new Mecca of the Grand Tour, was the ideal place to pursue his affair with Emma, and she in turn with the great British hero, Horatio Nelson. Connecting us to this great story are four pots once owned and held by Sir William now in the Nicholson Museum.

Online and Electronic Latin Resources

For the busy Classicist about town many of the most useful Latin reference works are prohibitively heavy. Instead of sending your chiropractor's children to university to study Latin, why not ditch the hundreds of pounds and thousands of pages of paper and carry it all around with you on your phone? Your brain will barely know the difference and your back (and bank account) will be eternally grateful. Here's a list of websites and apps that I couldn't live without:

Logeion: an online Latin (and Ancient Greek) dictionary run by the University of Chicago at http://logeion.uchicago.edu/index.html#ut. Provides results from both the full version of the Lewis and Short dictionary and Lewis's abridged Elementary Latin Dictionary. Also available as a free iOS app.

Perseus Digital Library: A free online mega-resource for the study of Latin and Ancient Greek run by Tuft's University at http://www.perseus.tufts.edu/hopper/. It can be clunky and slow, but the library of online Classical texts in the original and translation is a goldmine. Let she or he who hasn't turned to the "Word Study Tool" to be parsed out of a jam cast the first stone.

Lexidium: a \$5.00 iOS app which includes the complete Lewis and Short dictionary, Whitaker's Words (a decent dictionary with abbreviated entries, useful when you need a quick word) and, for an extra dollar, a parsing program.

SPQR Latin: available for \$6.00 for both Android and iOS Contains the complete Lewis and Short, a parsing program, an English-Latin dictionary, 1000 vocabulary flashcards, a helpful verb quiz, Allen and Greenough's New Latin Grammar, and more.

Grammaticus: a \$5.50 iOS app which includes all 500+ useful pages of the 1903 version of Allen and Greenough and, for those closet Hellenists out there, Smyth's Greek Grammar and Goodwin's Syntax of the Moods and Tenses of the Greek Verb. Not to be confused with the Android app Grammaticus Totus (\$9.00) which is a study aid designed specifically for the 7th edition of Wheelock's Latin textbook.
